This report presents our journey throughout 2023 on our path to realizing this vision.






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ANOTE Executive Director FROMOUR & Board Chair

We had an incredible year of growth and success at the Centre for Autism Services Alberta.

DOING MORE TO Make an Impact

In partnership with caring supporters like you, the Centre impacted **2,639** lives across Alberta.

2022-2023 Highlights

Sports & recreation programs are BACK!

Emerging post-pandemic, we successfully relaunched our community and recreation programs for children, teens and adults. We lowered registration fees to reduce barriers and create greater inclusivity, leading to a significant increase in registrants. This was made possible by grants from the Alberta Parks & Recreation Association and the Canadian Parks & Recreation Association. We also reignited our partnership with the YMCA for our Active for Life programming, welcoming and integrating participants into the community.

New on-site early childhood programs in Calgary!

In 2022-2023, we worked hard to launch a new on-site PUF preschool & kindergarten programs in Calgary beginning September 2023, which will expand our offerings to 24 more children and their families.

2022-2023 Highlights

Welcoming new community partners, major funders, sponsors.

We expanded our reach to seven new community partners for workforce development, bringing our total to eleven. We also acquired six new major funders and sponsors, allowing us to increase capacity and grow our services to reach even more individuals and their families.

Completion of the outdoor recreation area.

Installing the outdoor basketball zone was the final piece to our outdoor space, further enriching our Edmonton location for all participants and creating an interactive outdoor space in which to belong and thrive. The outdoor space was made possible by funding from the Stollery Charitable Foundation.

Making strides in **language accessibility**.

We translated five key intake communication forms into three different languages (Punjabi, Urdu, & Arabic), to ensure families have a full understanding of services and supports to support inclusivity through language accessibility.

We created an environment for volunteers to assist with translation services in family homes to help remove barriers and facilitate communication.

DOING MORE TO Change Internes

Changing outcomes means we take a holistic approach that considers each individual's unique strengths, needs, and aspirations, aiming to remove barriers and enhance their overall well-being. In 2022-2023, we expanded our services and reached more people, extending our impact further across the province, continuing to shift to a brighter future for *every* Autistic individual.

296 unique families supported -

BIG impact

While we celebrate the major milestone of opening Calgary Early Childhood Services, we are also reaching big, transitional milestones in Edmonton. In 2022-2023, our onsite Edmonton classroom celebrated its first graduates, saying farewell to the five graduates who completed our 3-year onsite program.

DOING MORE TO Empower Families

The Centre empowers families by providing comprehensive support, resources, and educational programs tailored to the unique needs of Autistic people. We offer parent workshops, access to specialized therapies, and inclusive environments, fostering an understanding and supportive community, ultimately equipping families to better navigate and advocate for their loved ones with autism. This year, the Centre continued to support family empowerment with a variety of consistent supports, services, and program offerings.

355 unique families totaling **1,014** individual family members

provided with activities and support intended to help build community and foster a sense of belonging.

An increase of 143 individuals over the past year.

EMPOWERING FAMILIES BY THE NUMBERS

RESPITE - 239 opportunities accessed by **27** families.

MORE FAMILY EVENTS - 175 families accessed 5 Centre events in Calgary & Edmonton, with 550 family members in attendance.

PARENT WORKSHOPS - **8** different workshops attended by **122** family members.

DOING MORE TO Enrich Lives

Enrichment means

we strive to add value and enhance the overall well-being and quality of life of Autistic people. By providing opportunities for positive experiences, skill development, and fostering a sense of belonging, we provide enrichment that empowers individuals with autism and their families to lead fulfilling lives.

MORE ACCESSIBILITY

With the help of grant funding, we reduced fees for **51 children, teens, and adults** in recreation programs, increasing accessibility, enhancing connectedness, and fostering inclusion.

ENRICHING LIVES BY THE NUMBERS

ART - **38** participants accessed **75** opportunities.

SPORTS & RECREATION - 51 participants accessed 71 opportunities.

SUMMER CAMP - 131 campers accessed 232 opportunities.

220 children, teens, and adults participated in 376 opportunities across our enrichment programs.

MEET MATHIESON

Mathieson is a talented artist who has been participating in our art programs for many years, developing his skills. Mathieson decided to share his passion and what he had learned, and now volunteers with our teen group in the Exploring Art program at the Nina Haggerty Centre. Recently, he asked to do more and signed up to volunteer with our Fun with Art program to learn new skills working with 6-12 year olds.

Not only does Mathieson inspire participants with new artistic perspectives, but he thrives when creating communication opportunities and making connections. Staff reports that Mathieson is kind, patient, polite, punctual, reliable, and always willing to help anywhere. He arrives at every shift with a positive attitude and takes the initiative to help the team prep and clean before and after sessions.

Mathieson will give participants verbal praise for their artwork and clear step-by-step instructions and explanations. Because of his years of experience, he is a great tour guide for new staff members and volunteers and knows where every art material is located.

BIG impact

The annual Art Show & Sale presented by Booster Juice was a major highlight, as participants sold over **80** paintings. Media coverage was on site, and an estimated **120** individuals came through the door.

DOING MORE TO Foster Independence

We work alongside Autistic adults, their families and the community to collaboratively foster independence and to help develop skills for life as they transition into adulthood and beyond. 109 teens & adults accessed 157 opportunities across programming related to increasing independence, learning employment skills, and enhancing practical living and social skills.

FOSTERING INDEPENDENCE -TEEN & ADULT SERIVICES BY THE NUMBERS

QUEST FOR INDEPENDENCE – **20** participants gained skills of independence for living and integrating into the community.

SHOP COOK LEARN – **7** participants gained new skills in the kitchen, created shopping lists and budgets, and learned how to navigate the grocery store.

TEEN SOCIAL NIGHT – 33 participants were able to hang out together and make and maintain friendships.

ADULT SOCIAL NIGHT – **153** participants socialized in an accepting environment where they are appreciated for their individuality.

VIRTUAL SOCIAL NIGHT – 9 participants gathered online weekly to stay socially connected.

Quest for Independence

structures its programming around factors that influence and contribute to one's quality of life, including well-being, independence and social participation. All Quest participants have the opportunity to engage in community volunteer opportunities during programming as a means of building vocational skills and giving back to our community.

QUEST FOR INDEPENDENCE

In 2022-2023, Quest's **commitment to community engagement** shone bright.

Quest actively participated in community clean-up initiatives in and around their program locations throughout the city. This effort contributed to cleaner surroundings and reinforced Quest's strong connection to their community. Quest's **spirit of community involvement** extended even further as they

expanded their participation with Roots for Trees, an organization dedicated to planting trees around the city. This collaboration provided Questers with three new opportunities to engage in tree-planting initiatives, helping make their city more environmentally sustainable and creating meaningful experiences for participants.

Questers collaborated with the City of Edmonton to provide

valuable input for the new Light Rail Vehicle (LRV) testing initiative. Several participants eagerly volunteered their time to take part in a focus group, exploring a new LRV cabin mock-up. Their insights and feedback played a crucial role in shaping the final design of the train, and the City expressed gratitude for Quest's time to contribute their unique perspectives. This collaboration was featured in a video widely promoted through the City's social media channels during National AccessAbility Week.

Quest participants secured a **community** garden plot

at King's University, where participants and staff spent the spring months planning what to plant, the summer months tending to the garden, and harvesting the produce at summer's end. Plans for next year's garden are already underway.

EMPLOYMENT**WORKS**

Employment*Works* is a proven program funded through the Government of Canada and the Sinneave Family Foundation that supports individuals on the spectrum in preparing for, getting, and keeping good jobs or pursuing further education.

In 2022-2023, the Centre actively engaged with **35** participants, focusing on pre-employment readiness, active labour market participation, and employment retention.

We offer dedicated job coaches to assist individuals in entering the labour market, and we continue to provide coaching to retain and maintain employment - creating more opportunities and changing the employment trajectory for Autistic individuals.

This year, the Employment*Works* programming was extended to 12 months to include the "Keeping Work Phase" to boost job success.

In the summer, we provided an intensive summer program to equip high school students with the skills they need to enter the job market, giving them a head start on their career journey.

We worked hard to expand our connections with employers. We created **7** new employment partnerships, bringing our tally to **11**. By doing so, we can offer more work experiences that enhance participants' confidence and promote inclusive employment practices.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

MEET SYDNEY

Sydney works as a Lab Coordinator in language processing research. "Lots of our Autistic participants volunteer for research as a way to give back to their community, so when I had the opportunity to volunteer for Centre, I knew I wanted to give back too."

Sydney began volunteering in our Active for Life program this past year. In the Active for Life program, Sydney got to know many participants but made a close connection with Liam. Sydney increased Liam's interest in fitness with ease by encouraging him to try a variety of cardio equipment. "We were really able to tailor the experience for Liam, and he loves the spin bikes and treadmills."

Liam now asks to try different equipment at each session!

Sydney demonstrates a genuine interest in getting to know each participant. While assigned to one participant, she makes an effort to say hi and interact with everyone. Sydney explains that volunteering makes her feel fulfilled. She adds that she always has good experiences, and the participants are all great to work with. "I absolutely love volunteering in Active for Life!"

When asked what she would tell others considering volunteering, "I'd tell them to look for a volunteer position that you can enjoy and are passionate about."

- The group held a "Stimformation" information session on stimming.
 They purchased some fidgets for participants and created an informative presentation to educate people about stimming.
